- 1: "Believing and doubting" (faith when times are hard).

<u>Annual Village Meeting</u> – 7:00 pm for 7:30 pm WEDNESDAY 16 April, at the Village Hall.

Refreshments, courtesy of the Chideock Society, will be available from 7:00pm with the meeting starting at 7:30pm.

The Parish Council will report on what has been done over the past year. WDDC Cllr Summers, DCC Cllr Turner and the Police will be invited to attend and speak about their work.

Representatives of Village groups are invited to give a short summary of their activities.

There will be an "open session" for residents to raise matters which they think the Parish Council should take on board.

If any matter is called to a vote then only people on the electoral role are eligible to vote.

This meeting has, by law, to be hosted by the Parish Council and must take place between 1 April and 1 June. The Chair of the Annual Village Meeting must be taken by the Chair of the Parish Council, if present, otherwise by the Vice Chair of the Parish Council. If neither is present then the Village Meeting must appoint someone to take the chair. The Clerk to the Parish Council takes the minutes.

The Annual Village Meeting is NOT a Parish Council meeting.

HOW CAN IT BE?

Often people ask me – How can it be that there are so many different denominations? In the 1730's when the Wesleys were coming into prominence, the two brothers Charles & John of hymn writing and preaching fame, reveal the answer to this question.

Both were Oxford graduates and were ordained as ministers in the established church with separate pastorates but were frustrated in their calling because they didn't seem to be getting through to their congregations. After a few years Charles took up a missionary invitation in America to reach out to the Red Indians whilst John continued to labour here in the UK. After three years Charles returned recognising his 'failure' to preach meaningful sermons and at the same time brother John also concurred that his hearers seemed to be bored; which did nothing for church growth.

Inspired by friends in the Moravian Church they both grasped the nettle and met the repentance challenge and made their peace with God... and the rest is history! Almost immediately their congregations warmed to their forthright preaching; now they were able to communicate the love of God because it had been made real to them. Now they were able to explain how to live out what the Bible calls us to do. But some within felt threatened by the change, such that the brothers were not welcomed in every pulpit. Undaunted by this objection they opted for open air preaching and from 1739 onwards they travelled up and down the land on horseback and thousands came to hear them.

Looking back we can now see that there was a 100 year period of spiritual hunger which resulted in meeting halls and chapels springing up in towns and villages all over the place (including Chideock) and that God was blessing these new ventures. Many different denominations emerged. Many people of that time looked at this denominational growth and said: How can it be?

It is interesting to consider that John the Baptiser as recorded in Matt.3 reveals a similar outreach scenario in that he was preaching in the open air in the desert. The people were drawn to his forthright preaching because they recognised their need to Get Right with God and that they had a spiritual hunger to know how to live a Godly life. John the Baptiser was preaching the need for people to repent of their sins and he did not hold back from telling the same message to the Pharisees and Sadducees who were feeling uncomfortable with this preaching. In verse 8 he challenges them by saying 'produce fruit in keeping with repentance' ... so what is fruit?

The fruit is the outcome of forthright Godly preaching, which promotes growth and which we see in the Wesley's ministry: - the birth of many new denominations, the formation of Methodism, 6,000 wonderfully uplifting hymns, books on Christian values and an estimated growth increase of 80,000 new Christians coming into the churches. Methodism also introduced prison visiting, outreach to the poor and needy, schools and was a major player in the abolition of slavery. We may rightly say that all this new growth was the 'fruit' of Wesleys repentance ... Praise God.

In recent times observers will have noted that the new wave of church growth is within the Evangelical Christian Fellowships where similar forthright preaching occurs.

So now it's the turn of those denominations that were birthed at the time of the Wesleys 1750-1850, to acknowledge the growth of the new Christian Fellowships ... now they are the ones saying: How can it be?

Trading Standards' advice: Don't be a victim twice!

Can anyone now remember when it wasn't raining? Combined

with strong winds and rising water levels many of us have experienced damage to property in our homes and gardens. Have you been a victim of this persistent bad weather?


Maybe now you're wondering if the worst has passed and with spring knocking at the door perhaps you're thinking of repairing and securing the damage already done. Some damage will be easy to repair and many will be up to the DIY challenge! Some damage though will require professional help and often we don't know who to call to put it right. If you choose someone from an advert or directory that is not known to you, or agree to have work carried out by an opportunist uninvited doorstep trader, then you could be setting yourself up for more than you bargained for.

We do! The Trading Standards Buy With Confidence scheme brings together local traders of all professions who we have personally checked. If you visit our website you will even see what other customers think of them. Dorset County Council Trading Standards Service check and approve businesses so you don't have to.

COMMUNITY POLICING ...

Recently there have been reports to Police that livestock have escaped from fields and have strayed onto roads. We would ask that owners of livestock regularly check their boundary fences and ensure that



they are secure. On occasions where we have been called to retrieve animals we have been unable to identify the owners. With this in mind it would be useful for owners that keep livestock on land away to provide neighbours at the location with all relevant contact details, because the first port of call for the Police will be nearby properties.

We can start to expect many visitors to Dorset and with this a large increase in vehicles on the roads. Remember the two vital elements of driving, speed (appropriate) and road position. Driving on country lanes should be approached with a different frame of mind than that of busy main roads. If anyone would like to discuss this aspect of road safety please contact us.

I remind locals and visitors to the area of the importance of removing valuable items from your vehicles when you park, especially when at beauty spots.

Hiding items is NOT a crime deterrent; the only way to guarantee items will not be taken is to take them with you.

On 22nd February at 1230 a call came in from young local woman making us aware of three males acting suspiciously in the area of Powerstock Common, they provided Police with an accurate number plate and description of the vehicle linked to the males. Police attended and spoke with these three males, who are linked to vehicle crime in Dorset and surrounding counties, after Police engagement they promptly left the area. It is likely that this local member of publics' swift action and pro-active engagement with Dorset Police has deterred a crime. Please ensure that all suspicious activities are reported to Dorset Police on 101. Dorset Police are very grateful for this local person's action. Please report any suspicious activity/incidents on the non-emergency number 101.

Members arrived to meet Rosalind Atkins who had already prepared a display of decorative buttons to illustrate her talk. The button making trade dates back to the early 1600s when it was a lucrative small industry based on home-working and small town business units. By 1700 the Dorset company set up by Abraham Case, inventor of many buttons including the 'Dorset Knob' button was exporting buttons to America and other parts of the world. This trade continued nationally until it sharply declined following the introduction of an automated button maker demonstrated at the Great Exhibition of 1851.

Colourful, decorative buttons never go out of fashion and can make a simple garment special. Rosalind showed us examples of the 'High top' – a conical button originally made on a head of corn as a base for the threads. The 'Dorset Knob' button was made on a hard base with stitching on top and was mostly for women's clothes. The smaller 'Birds Eye' button was for children's clothing. Even the least craft minded of us was fired with enthusiasm to have a go at making a button. Guided by Rosalind we attempted the 'Singleton' button where the coloured thread is wrapped around a metal ring with varying results but general enjoyment!
