Last year Richard raised £1,052.00. This was divided equally between St. Giles Parish Church and DHCT. Gift Aid donations adding significantly to the total raised.



Hello all. Over the last month there has been a noticeable increase in the number of thefts from motor vehicles and outbuildings in the area. Cars and vans have been targeted in some of our common hotspots, areas frequented by walkers for example, as well as within towns and villages. Handbags and power tools have been the main items taken. Sheds and garages have also been broken into across the area, with power tools again being the prime target. Dorset Police ask that you remove all items when parking your vehicles, and also consider the crime prevention methods you have in place to protect any outbuildings from theft. Chideock Art Group has flourished for many years adapting and reinventing itself over that time to keep up with current approaches to art and the demands of its members. ## CHIDEOCK VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE IMPORTANT NOTICE

The 1949 Trust Deed, which forms the basis of the operating and governing rules under which the Village Hall is managed, names 10 Chideock based, non-commercial organisations, all with aims broadly similar to those of the Village Hall itself [see below]. Of the original 10 groups, 4 are still in existence and continue to be represented on the Management Committee [St. Giles PCC, W.I., Catholic Church and Parish Council]; 3 are known to no longer exist [Mixed Youth Club, Mothers' Union and Bridport Rural District Council]. The remaining 3 groups are: Children of Mary, Committee of British Legion and the Committee of the Farmers' Club. Unless proof of the continued existence of any of these groups is furnished by 30 September 2014, it will be assumed that they are defunct and a resolution to remove them, together with the 3 groups known no longer to exist, from Schedule 2 of the Trust Deed, will be proposed at the next Annual General Meeting on 27 October.

WE HAVE NOW BECOME AWARE THAT THE CHILDREN OF MARY NO LONGER EXISTS AS AN ACTIVE GROUP IN CHIDEOCK

### **Object of Chideock Village Hall**

The Trust premises shall be held in trust for the purposes of physical and mental training and recreation, and social, moral and intellectual development through the medium of reading and recreation rooms, library, lectures, classes, recreations and entertainments, or otherwise as may be found expedient, for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Parish of Chideock in the County of Dorset and its immediate vicinity, without distinction of sex or of political, religious or other opinions.

### JONAH AND THE \*\*\*\*\*

On hearing the story of Jonah and the big fish many of us have asked ourselves: Is it possible for a person to be swallowed by a whale and then to be spat out alive in a different place? Intriguing through this question is, the main significance of this story lies in God's mercy at the heart of it – how He warned a nation to turn away from their sin, and upon their doing this He forgave them (Jonah Chapter 3). God looked down from Heaven upon Assyria (modern Iraq) and saw how this nation had become wealthy by pillaging the countries around them, how their reputation for brutality caused neighbouring peoples to live in fear of them.

God instructed the prophet Jonah to 'Go to the great city of Nineveh and preach against it, because its wickedness has come up before me.' (Jonah 1v1) ... God sees all we do – the good things as well as the bad. After his initial disobedience to take God's word to a fearsome nation, Jonah eventually gave God's message, and the warning of impending disaster if the people continued in their wicked ways: 'Forty more days and Nineveh will be overturned' (Jonah 3v4).

We can only speculate as to whether God had previously sent other prophets to Nineveh with this dire warning, whether they had been ignored, whether this was God's final ultimatum. For two centuries the Ninevites had made their own rules, worshipped pagan gods, and indulged in all sorts of sinful perversions. Deep down they knew only too well that their lifestyle choices were contrary to God's best, they knew that they had misused people and become fat at the expense of others. When faced with God's challenge the Ninevites may have considered how obedience to God would affect their wealth, dominance, future prestige ... but amazingly, they responded in a Godly way. When the King of Assyria and the Ninevites heard God's ultimatum through Jonah, a foreign prophet, the burden of their consciences overcame their past complacency – suddenly they recognised their sinful ways and they knew that they must get right with God. They knew that they had to get serious and repent of their sins. Running away wasn't the answer, nor was pretending they hadn't heard or burying their heads in the sand – they knew that Jonah had been sent by God, and they recognised that the extent of their decades of sin deserved punishment.

As an expression of Godly sorrow for sin the king took off his rich robes and put on sackcloth, he sat in the dust and proclaimed a fast (Jonah 3 v 6-10). The king declared over his people: 'Let them give up their evil ways and their violence. Who knows? God may yet relent and with compassion turn from his fierce anger so that we will not perish' (Jonah 3v8).

The king and his subjects repented. ('Repent' means to come to your sense after due consideration and regret and turn back to where you should be. It is a change of mind followed by a permanent change of direction).

'When God saw what they did and how they turned from their evil ways, he had compassion and did not bring upon them the destruction he had threatened.' (Jonah 3v10).

The same is true for us today in that God can save us from our sin destination if we will recognise our sin, humble ourselves before Him and repent. When we choose to get right with Him, His compassion flows in forgiveness ... and that's what we call being born again ... as Christians. God was able to forgive the mountains of sin that the Ninevites committed, and He is able to forgive us today for whatever wrongs we have done – but he can only forgive us on His terms.

'I tell you, there is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents.' (Lk 15v10). Humphrey Barker.

### CHIDEOCK SOCIETY

A few intrepid walkers met at 10am on August 9th to carry out the ancient tradition of Beating the Bounds, walking the Parish Boundary, a round trip of nearly 12 miles.

Starting at Seatown, 3 plus a dog, went East to walk the boundary with Eype and Symondsbury and one lone walker went West to cover the boundary between Stanton St Gabriel and Morcombelake.

The easterly group took a diversion to have a coffee at Downhouse Farm, the lone westerly walker diverted up to Golden Cap then was joined by one other at Filcombe Farm and then another at Ryall. The views were spectacular on such a clear, sunny day, we saw clouded yellow butterflies, scores of pheasants and partridge, buzzards and possibly a red kite. Apart from some missing signs the two groups met up as agreed at Hounsells Corner in North Chideock within 10 minutes of each other. The three eastern walkers plus Willow the dog, then valiantly carried on and completed the whole walk finishing by 4pm.

Special thanks to Mike Tuck, John Hallett and Colin Bowditch for planning the route and to all those who took part.

We hoped more would join us to keep the old custom alive. No-one was turned upside down to have their heads banged on the boundary stones to make sure they remember where the parish boundary is - we have maps these days. The first sections of the routes are steep, but you can join for the downhill stretches which were very enjoyable and allow the village to be viewed from different aspects – well worth coming next year.

### TRADING STANDARDS ...

We do not deal with uninvited traders. That's the message Dorset County Council Trading Standards Service is giving to cold calling traders with our new refreshed door stickers.

Maybe you see a knock at the door from an uninvited trader as an inconvenience or annoyance. Some people find it threatening having to say no to someone uninvited on their doorstep, especially if it's high pressure selling for anything from a packet of dusters to building work.

Uninvited doorstep traders will use all sorts of techniques to try to get you to say yes, that's their job after all, and they are experts at it. Perhaps you've heard the patter 'We're only in the area today', 'We've some material left from a job up the road', 'You'll have to agree now to get this price', 'my livelihood depends on this sale'. Perhaps you've fallen for it in the past?

Over the years many Dorset residents have decided to say 'No' to uninvited doorstep traders by displaying one of our bright doorcards and they have proved to be one of the most popular resources we produce.

Now refreshed and updated the 'We do not deal with uninvited traders' doorsticker comes in two parts. There is an outside sticker for your front door with a clearly visible message to uninvited traders. There is an inside sticker to act as a reminder with phone numbers for who to call if you need advice, assistance, or to report a caller.

Recently it's become a criminal offence for a trader not to leave your home when asked, or to return again another time. We and those we work with, Dorset Police and district and borough council Community Safety teams, hope the newly refreshed stickers will help you to say 'No' by deterring uninvited traders from knocking at your door.

We've made them for you so why not pick up a pair of stickers at your district or borough council office reception, or by sending a small letter sized stamped addressed envelope to: No Uninvited Doorstep Traders, Trading Standards Service, Colliton Annexe, Colliton Park, Dorchester, DT1 1XJ.

### CHIDEOCK VILLAGE HALL UPDATE

Just a brief note to thank all those who have supported and raised funds for the Chideock Village Hall so far this year and to let you all know a little of what we have done and are planning to do.

So far we have completed a number of essential repairs:

- replaced one of the rotten wooden windows and the emergency lighting
- tested the wiring to meet statuary requirements and solved the leak in the heating system so the Hall should be warmer this winter
- patch-repaired the leaking flat roof of the toilet block.

You may also have noticed the new signs on the Village Hall external walls to advertise events

In September we plan to undertake an investigation of the main structure of the building and try to repair part of the rotten timber frame. We can then replace the external door to the committee room which is also rotten. We are also obtaining quotes to carry out a more permanent repair to the flat roof of the toilet block so that this area can be redecorated.

Plenty going on but you may not see the outcome of this essential work until we reach the stage when we can redecorate the outside of the Hall!
