
The giving and distribution of produce will take the form of a BRING AND BUY sale.

CHIDEOCK VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT **COMMITTEE - IMPORTANT NOTICE**

The 1949 Trust Deed, which forms the basis of the operating and governing rules under which the Village Hall is managed, names 10 Chideock based, non-commercial organisations, all with aims broadly similar to those of the Village Hall itself [see below]. Of the original 10 groups, 4 are still in existence and continue to be represented on the Management Committee [St. Giles PCC, W.I., Catholic Church and Parish Council]; 3 are known to no longer exist [Mixed Youth Club, Mothers' Union and Bridport Rural District Councill. The remaining 3 groups are: Children of Mary, Committee of British Legion and the Committee of the Farmers' Club. Unless proof of the continued existence of any of these groups is furnished by 30 September 2014, it will be assumed that they are defunct and a resolution to remove them, together with the 3 groups known no longer to exist, from Schedule 2 of the Trust Deed, will be proposed at the next Annual General Meeting on 27 October.

New play equipment at Clapps Mead Paying Field.

As you may have seen, a new basket swing has been installed in the Children's Play Area at Clapps Mead Playing Field. This has been purchased by the Parish Council with money from the Precept which has been put aside for this purpose over a number of years.

Clapps Mead is owned by the Parish Council on behalf of the village – it is **YOUR** playing field. The Playing Field Management Group and the Parish Council manage this area and all equipment is regularly checked for defects and repairs done. The Parish Council pays for the annual RoSPA (Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents) inspection to be carried out and acts on any issues found during this inspection.

The Parish Council thanks Mr Maskell, Teresa Mudford and Lee Martin for cutting the grass and keeping the area neat and tidy; and the Management Committee and everyone else who has played any part in helping to look after the playing field area.

Superfast Broadband for Chideock.

The Superfast Dorset Team has informed the Clerk that Superfast Broadband for Chideock is unfortunately bogged down by red tape. The "green box" (which has to be upgraded in order for Superfast Broadband to be made available) is on the pavement adjoining the A35 and therefore the Highways Agency has to give their consent for the work and a safety audit has to be carried out before the consent can be given.

Our speaker was Bruce Upton from the Bridport Museum, on his second visit to the WI. This time he came to regale us with excerpts from papers exposing everyday life in Dorset in the early 1600's, as seen through the Justices of the peace, under the title of 'Lewd

His material was taken from original papers, records of the Justices quarter sessions held during the time of Charles Ist up to the outbreak of the Civil War. These had been recently discovered and bought by the museum as they related

The village of Upwey seemed to have been a centre for the common offence of drunkenness, with an unlicensed alehouse and unlawful gaming. Unmarried pregnant women, attempts to identify and make responsible the likely fathers of children took up many sessions. The alternative that mothers and children fell on the mercy of the local Poor Law was not a happy one.

Readers of our current tabloid papers may well feel, so not much has changed since then!

Residents of Chideock in 1625 were threatened with fines or worse if they did not repair the highway through the village. This was a local responsibility along with the obligation on parishes to billet soldiers on 'military business' in the area or when passing through.

You certainly wouldn't want to be elderly, mentally defective or idle at this time as *all* were required by law to work. Looking on the bright side, if you were destitute but could find yourself a vacant 4 acres in the local area you could gain permission to build your own home, perhaps a 'pent house' (17th century term for shed) for your family and set up a subsistence smallholding. Hey ho how the incontinent use of words in English language has also changed.

Thanks were given to Bruce for an entertaining and informative talk.

TRADING STANDARDS

Why is it that sales representatives always ring just as you sit down to eat or get in the bath? Is there anything you can do to try to stop it?

It's not illegal to cold call either in person or by phone in itself, unless you have already told the business that you do not wish to be contacted by them.

If they are contacting you by telephone then caller display on your phone can help; if you don't recognise the number, don't answer it. But what if friends and family have witheld numbers – you don't want to miss their calls.

We recommend registering your telephone number with the Telephone Preference Service (TPS). This is a free 'opt out' service which records your preference not to receive unsolicited sales or marketing calls from UK based companies. Once registered, report any persistent callers to the TPS – you'll need to know what company they have called from and when they called. UK companies that persist in calling TPS registered telephone numbers can face large fines. A local company was recently fined £37,992.00 following action taken by Trading Standards for ignoring residents' wishes not to call them.

HOW GOOD IS YOUR CREDIT?

Last month, when I was in the local builders' merchants buying paint and using my credit card for payment, the machine refused my card with the word 'declined', - not what I'd expected, and a bit embarrassing. I was requested to 'Try again Mr. Barker'. This time I entered my correct PIN and left the shop with the paint.

One day, when shopping, my wife Elizabeth discovered that her credit card was not in its usual place. We got together enough cash to settle the bill before serious panic took hold. Worst-case scenarios of what might have happened to our money flashed through our minds as fear gripped us. We prayed in the car park, asking God to keep the card and our finances safe. Elizabeth remembered that the previous use of the card had been in Bridport several days before – the supermarket had found the card and she collected it from customer services. What a relief! Our credit was still good!

How good is your credit?

Years ago I remember being telephoned at midnight by a lady from our church. She'd just returned from a West End theatre visit, and to her horror realised that she'd left her handbag on the tube. It contained cash, credit cards, cheque book, car and house keys, passport, driving licence, glasses ... we said we'd pray and ask God to enable everything to be returned to her. A day or so later a young man rang her – he'd found the handbag and had posted it to her, first class. Returned – with all the contents. Praise God for answered prayer!

But how good is your credit with God?

I pose this question because there are some who consider that they are heaven worthy, although they haven't actually fulfilled gthe credit conditions.

Most of us know about the Billy Graham crusades of past years. Billy Graham brought an anointed message of salvation to which thousands responded. At the end of the meetings people were invited to do 2 things – firstly, to come forward into the arena and pray a prayer of commitment, and secondly to attend a local church for repentance discipleship. Although thousands made a sincere commitment to follow Jesus, it seems that few followed this up with repentance. As a result few followed this up with repentance. As a result few were born again – despite an initial enthusiasm they failed the credit conditions.

For many years my mother was adamant that her attendance at a Billy Graham Crusade made her a Christian. 'Attendance without the repentance' fails the salvation challenge ... and does nothing for one's creditworthiness with God. It wasn't until she was over 80, that with timely reflection was she able to remember that she had avoided the second invitation.

When presented with the words of King Solomon in the book of Ecclesiastes chapter 12 where it is written in verses 13-14:

Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter God will bring every deed into Judgment, including every hidden thing.

Whether it is good or evil'. ... my mother then recognised that now was the time to get right with God.
