PLANTLIFE BEE SCENE

Plantlife's hugely successful 'Bee Scene' survey has been rescued by family-owned cereal maker Nature's Path, after its original funding had ended. Over 30,000 children have already taken part in the wild flower survey since its launch in 2010. Now thousands more will have the opportunity to explore the nature on their doorstep and learn about the wild flowers growing there.

Families can discover whether their local area is good for bumblebees by looking for bee-friendly wild flowers such as foxgloves, dandelions and clovers in their local green spaces. The results are then uploaded onto a virtual meadow map of the UK.

The survey raises awareness and understanding in children of the importance of biodiversity in their local area, starting them on a path to enjoying wild flowers and realising their importance as part of our natural heritage. It also helps them understand the importance of wild plants for our declining pollinators. 90% of teachers who did the survey reported that 'Bee scene' had given them new learning about the natural environment and helped pupils understand that different wild plants are important for bees.

The **Ridwood Affordable Housing development** is now completed and local families and young people who live in Chideock or have a local connection to Chideock have moved in to their new homes. The new properties are to be known as The Green, Ridwood, Chideock. The properties have been built by G.G. Fry to a high specification and will offer much needed affordable accommodation to sons and daughters of parents who currently live in the village and families that have been living in other areas but wished to return to Chideock to be close to their extended families. I have been extremely impressed with WDDC Housing Team and Magna Housing who have been stringent in applying the terms of the S.106 Legal document which stated the necessity of anyone applying to have a Chideock connection. All the properties are now occupied and we would welcome all the new families to our village.

Affordable housing is of huge importance to people in our local area as we are all aware private housing is so expensive in this particular part of West Dorset. I have fought for over ten years alongside Rob Murray, Kate Geraghty and others to secure these affordable homes and Chideock was very fortunate that this development for our young people and families was chosen to go ahead. I am aware that some were very worried that the properties would not be allocated to 'people from Chideock' and even the wording of the S106 Agreement did not allay their fears so I am very happy to advise that all properties have been let to genuine bona-fide Chideock families. These properties will always be 'identified' as being for 'local Chideock people' and so as families 'move on' younger members of Chideock will have the opportunity to rent these properties.

Lastly, I would like to give thanks to Robyn Symes – my fellow Community Liaison Officer who has done a brilliant job in organising the site with regard to parking, drainage solutions and a million other everyday problems with such zeal and enthusiasm. Building a new development next door to an existing development can cause lots of problems to residents but Robyn has been on the case and sorted out any concerns and enabled the development to go quickly ahead. I would also like to thank those residents of Ridwood for their patience and understanding at what must have been at times very difficult.

TRADING STANDARDS

Crime does not pay

You may be interested to know that 7 out of every 10 crimes committed are acquisitive crime, those are crimes where the perpetrator has gained financially from their wrong doing.

In 2002 the Government introduced the Proceeds of Crime Act, a law allowing enforcement agencies including Trading Standards the ability to identify, freeze, and through the courts apply for confiscation of criminal property gained from crime. Criminal property includes both savings and assets, such as houses and other lifestyle goods. The philosophy behind this is that when criminal finance is removed then further funding of criminal enterprises will stop.

In 2012 /2013 in excess of £12 million was recovered from convicted criminals by Trading Standards nationally using this process. The types of crime that Trading Standards Services have been using this legislation for include:

- Food fraud
- Supplying unsafe goods
- Selling counterfeit goods such as clothing and electrical products
- Rogue trading often targeting the vulnerable
- Car traders who misdescribe cars
- Scams whether by post, phone or the internet
- Illegal livestock slaughterhouses

Any money confiscated through the courts is redistributed by the Home Office and a percentage is given back to the Local Authority to be used specifically on local crime prevention initiatives.

If you suspect you have been a victim of crime by someone selling you goods or services then why not let us know about it. Call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 03454 04 05 06 where all calls are treated confidentially. Working with Citizens Advice we may be able to help you resolve the problem, seek to obtain money back and prevent the same happening to someone else.

COMMUNITY POLICING ...

Hello everyone. There have been two further thefts from motor vehicles at Langdon Woods in the past month; the



first saw keys, bank cards and a mobile phone stolen, the other a purse. Local officers continue to patrol the local beauty spots affixing warning posters, but I would also politely ask that locals be vigilant when in the area - it should be noted however that the majority of victims are from out of the area. Beaminster and Bridport Police have also received several calls recently from concerned residents who have had flyers posted through their doors offering gardening work. Our advice is that if you are not interested, simply recycle the flyer, and if anybody comes to your door touting for business then tell them you are not interested and shut the door. If you experience any issues with people being overly pushy or aggressive, call 999 immediately.

Calling all Mobile Library Users.

There is a consultation about the Dorset County Council Mobile Library Service. Dorset County Council says

"One of the mobile library vehicles needs to be replaced as it is over 10 years old and we need to ensure that we have a reliable vehicle. A new vehicle will cost approx. £100,000 to buy. We have considered how the mobile library service operates and how it is used and how we can become more efficient. This is because the County Council is seeking to increase efficiency and reduce costs across all services.

Over a third of the stops are used by less than four customers and less than 10 items are issued (on average) per visit. This is an inefficient use of the vehicle and staff. Where this happening, we are proposing withdrawing these stops and finding an alternative way of providing continued access to library services for these customers. This will mean that the overall number of stops will be reduced. For many customers the service will continue although the day and time on which it visits is likely to change.

We need to consider how the service can deliver a mobile library service for local communities where it is needed. In doing so, the mobile library fleet will reduce from four vehicles to three. This will enable the County Council to save money on running costs and avoid the need to spend money on a new vehicle. Withdrawing a mobile vehicle will save £50,000 per year."

The Chideock service appears to be safe though the day / time when it visits will probably change.

Please complete the questionnaire – copies are available from the Mobile Library. End date 4 September.

Parking Enforcement.

Dorset County Council is responsible for the enforcement of on-street parking restrictions, such as single and double yellow lines. If you are aware of persistent violations then you can contact the Parking Services Team on 01305 228110 or e-mail parking@dorsetcc.gov.uk and ask for an Enforcement Officer to visit the area.

Obstruction and moving traffic offences remain a Police issue.
