CHIDEOCK WI

Report of Chideock W.I. Meeting held an 2nd February 2016.

Who do you think you are? This was the title for our speaker Bruce Upton at the Chideock W.I. February meeting. The T.V. programme of that name suggests that researching the past would run smoothly but this was seldom the case. The talk was not referring to individual genealogy. It was about tracing past decades of the beautiful village of Chideock. A village that is fortunate enough to have its own Museum. Bruce said that there were three periods in such genealogy. Pre. 1841, 1841 to 1911, 1911 to the present day. The Museum in Chideock is a valuable source for early information whist the Bridport Museum has many available records. From 1841 there is generally a deluge of recorded census statistics due to poor quality of ink, incorrect spelling of names, irregular marks on pages and alterations. We delved into dominating surnames, unusual Christian names, occupations and statistics of the village population. The highest record of residents was 884 in the mid 1850's, declining thereafter to 1931 and rising again after World War 2. Bruce's enthusiasm with this fascinating subject was evident, he said that researching genealogy was a challenge and once started on local history it was possible to get hooked. Shirley Lambert thanked the speaker for sharing the information with us. After tea, served with chocolate cake and strawberry flan provided by Bev Taylor, the President Linda Gould reminded us of the forthcoming Craft Group and Natter Lunch. A letter was read thanking us for donating £100 to "Cupboard Love" food bank. Linda thanked the members for the tremendous effort put into the recent "Dorset Evening" event which raised £750 for our village community fund. Two returning members received a warm welcome and we would be pleased to welcome new members or visitors to our group which meets in the village hall on the first Tuesday of the month.

A DATE FOR YOUR DIARY

The Friends of St. Giles Spring Lunch will be held on Sunday April 10th

"K.I.S.S. – KEEP IT SIMPLE – STUPID!"

I preached several Sermons on Valentine's Day on this Acronym of "K.I.S.S.". I expect you've heard this phrase before – it has its good and its bad points! There is no question that life has become far more complex than ever before – in terms of our own individual hectic lives, the issues our society faces, and the theories about how our world works! To take one example – I was reading this week about what scientists claim is the most important astronomical discovery of this century. This has to do with 'Gravitational Waves', predicted to exist by Albert Einstein a hundred years ago. This sounds straightforward until you read the scientific explanation – apparently the power released by the collision of two black holes 'tore' at the fabric of space / time itself distorting its four dimensions for a few thousandths of a second. It released more energy than all the stars in the universe during that time. Astronomers hope that this new discovery will help them detect the original 'big bang'.

I find it very hard to get my head around these scientific discoveries — maybe you do too. But should this mean that we give up trying? God has created a wonderful world - beautiful in its complexity — and I think it's good that we stretch our minds to understand more. The same goes for the truths of the Christian faith — such as our beliefs about God. It is good to learn more about the nature of the Godhead and how God interacts with our world and our lives — probing the mysteries of divinity.

On the other hand it is good to keep our lives from getting too cluttered. Someone has said: "Simplicity is making the journey of this life with just enough baggage". One of the Christian Aid slogans says: "Live simply that others can simply live". Too much complexity not only over-stresses our minds, but can also distract us from the really important purposes of life. And in addition, "KISS" when lived out at a spiritual as well as material level releases us to assist in the well-being of others.

COMMUNITY POLICING ...

Hello everyone. The only crime I have to report to you this month is criminal damage to a speed camera in Chideock in the early hours of Saturday 13th February. A fire was started at its base, using wood and a solvent can. If you have any information relating to this crime, please call 101.



Beaminster Police regularly receive complaints of mud on the road, and will always act on these reports by assessing the issue, and identifying whether a local farmer or the local authority should be responsible for its clearing. In brief, if mud is brought onto the road from a field, at a gateway for example, it is the farmer's responsibility, whereas mud cut in from the verges along a road would generally be the responsibility of the local authority. A colleague recently received report of an incident near Askerswell, in which a member of the public, unhappy with mud on the road due to an ongoing farming operation, blocked the road with their vehicle, preventing the operation from continuing. I would like to take this opportunity to advise strongly against this sort of action, and request that a call is made to Dorset Police instead - there would be a strong possibility of offences being committed by preventing lawful use of the road by the farmer.

Finally, I would be interested to hear from anybody interested in becoming a Homewatch coordinator for their area. There is currently a vacancy in the area of North Chideock. Tell us about Illegal Tobacco.



Anyone selling illegal tobacco commits a criminal offence. The seller can face up to 10 years in prison and an unlimited fine. Why does it carry such a heavy penalty? Sold at pocket money prices, cheap tobacco makes it all too easy for our children to start smoking. The sale helps fund organised crime and those selling illegal tobacco may also be selling other illegal goods and introducing more crime into your local community.

So what is the law on this? It is not illegal for you to go abroad and buy cheap cigarettes for your own use but bringing them back and selling them is.

If tobacco doesn't come through legal supply chains it could very easily be a counterfeit product. The manufacture of counterfeit tobacco isn't regulated so you can't tell where it comes from or what it is made out of. Where counterfeit tobacco has been tested and has failed those safety tests it has been found to contain asbestos, animal faeces and glass. Since 2011 cigarettes must also be able to self extinguish themselves too, but illegal tobacco is more likely to cause fatal blazes as they may not self extinguish.

How to spot illegal tobacco:

- Often tastes different;
- Can be sold in boxes with poor print quality and have spelling mistakes;
- Might be sold in packets without required safety warnings;
- Sold in packaging with a handmade look and feel.

Trading standards are committed to disrupting the sale of illegal tobacco and you can help us. If you think you have information about someone selling illegal tobacco, or know a place where it is sold, then please help us. Any information no matter how small may be the piece we need. You can tell us anonymously on-line at www.stop-illegal-tobacco.co.uk or by phoning the illegal tobacco hotline number on 0300 999 0000.

CAROL SINGING

Our annual village Carol Service was, as always, a great blessing to us all -a beautifully decorated church, Bible readings and wonderful Christmas music -a splendid celebration of our Saviour's birth. This is the heart of Christmas, the reason for the season.

Sometimes we sing 'Hark the herald angels sing' – that uplifting hymn by Charles Wesley – a carol that expresses Godly truths ...'God and sinners reconciled.... Jesus our Emmanuel... born to give them second birth.' Such familiar words – and yet I wonder if we really understand the meaning of the words we enjoy singing.

For instances – 'born t give them second birth' – what does that mean? Wesley knew, because he'd experienced it. Initially, as an ordained minister, he hadn't understood what the second birth was all about – no one had told him and he hadn't worked it out for himself from John 3v3... 'You <u>must</u> be born again'. Many phrases mean the same as born again/second birth – coming into the Light, being converted, getting saved, getting right with God, and so on.

In childhood I somehow didn't see the love of God in my strict Sunday School teacher, and I put off making any commitment to Jesus. It's easily done. You may remember the sad story of Murdo who rejected God's offer of second birth and died that very night. My father was much the same.

God's offer of second birth came to me when I was nearly 42. Two fellow businessmen gave me a lift back from a meeting. One asked a question I didn't want to answer: 'Humphrey, how well do you know Jesus?' This totally unexpected challenge threw me into confusion and I immediately felt very fearful at the mention of the name Jesus. I couldn't get out of the car quickly enough! I rushed back to the safety of my office desk and dealt with things I could understand ... but that question didn' go away. It as like someone had shot an arrow into my heart, and it was in deep.

I can now see a similarity with what is written in the Book of Acts, 2v37... of how the people responded when they heard that their agreement with the authorities had led to Jesus being crucified. As they recognised thei collective guilt 'they were <u>cut</u> to the heart and said to Peter and the other apostles, 'Brothers, what shall we do?' It was like that for me – I was <u>cut</u> to the heart and my conscience was screaming to make a response.

In Acts 2v38 Peter replied: 'Repent and be baptised, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins.'

Charles Wesley met that challenge many years ago, and now it was my turn. After 3 weeks of deliberating I allowed the Holy Spirit to draw me into an empty church where I confessed my sins and hurts aloud to God and experienced that second birth for myself.

Is the Holy Spirit prompting you? How will you respond?

Almost There! Superfast Broadband for Chideock.

The latest news from the Superfast Dorset Team is that the new green cabinet has been installed (the location has changed – it is now outside Warren House) and should be "live" by the time you read this. Look out for the appearance of a superfast broadband sticker on the cabinet – once that it there the box is live and ready to go.

BUT don't forget that you won't get Superfast automatically – <u>you have to sign up for it with an Internet Service Provider and it will cost more than your existing package</u>. Also, <u>there is no guarantee that you will get the maximum speed</u> – it all depends on the length of copper wire between your property and the green cabinet.

New play equipment at Clapps Mead Paying Field.

The "spring" type play item for younger children and the new wooden framed double swing have been ordered and it is hoped that they will be installed by Easter.

A grant for 20% of the cost has been obtained by the Parish Council from the West Dorset Leisure Development Fund. The rest of the money is coming from the Clapps Mead Playing Field "reserve" fund which the Parish Council tops up each year from the Precept.

Mud and other debris on the Highway.

Please note that it is an offence under the Highways Act 1980 to deposit or cause deposit of mud, hedge trimmings, grass cuttings etc on any highway – pavements / footways / public footpaths and bridleways are included in the definition of a "highway".

Mud, hedge trimmings, grass cutting etc cause a hazard to vehicles, pedestrians and animals and block the rain water drains, which causes flooding.

Public Footpath and Bridleway issues.

Please let the Clerk or a Councillor know of any issues of which you are aware – broken stiles and gates, missing or poorly located signs, overgrown or obstructed paths etc., so that these can be brought to the attention of the Dorset County Council Rights of Way.

CHIDEOCK SOCIETY ... CHIDEOCK RESIDENTS INTO EXTRA TIME TO HAVE THEIR SAY.

Residents of Chideock and Seatown interested in the Government funded Coastal Revival Scheme attended a meeting in the Village Hall to hear an progress report on the Seatown Regeneration Project. Thanks to the intrepid St Giles Church 'Posties', every household in the parish had already received the details of the project and been invited to send their comments, suggestions and ideas on "Saving Seatown for the Future", by email, phone or suggestion boxes placed in the Village Shop and pubs. Twenty four residents joined 21 landowners and stakeholders for a powerpoint presentation by Simon Williams, leader of the Feasibility Study Team. This covered a brief history of the funding bid and research carried out so far on some of the problems, safer access, car parking improvements including provision for the disabled and clearer effective, signage.

The aims of the project are to find possible solutions to problems identified by residents over many years, which have got worse due to the increased number of storms and more traffic trying to access Seatown along the narrow lane, making any visit by foot, wheelchair, horse, bike or car an unpleasant and frustrating experience.

Questions, concerns and comments were invited from those present which led to lively discussion and many points were noted by the Team for further research.
