Report of Chideock W.I. Monthly meeting held on Nov.7th 2017



In November we were astounded at the history found in Honiton Lace which goes back more than 400 years. Our INSPIRING WOMEN speaker Pat Perryman became associated with Honiton Lace when many years ago she joined an evening class to learn the skill. Pat looks back on that time which completely changed her life. Recently being awarded the British Ensign Medal for 49 years work in hand made lace. Lace making began in Italy during the period 1500 to 1560. Elizabeth the 1st and Shakespeare wore lace collars and ruffs. In the play 12th Night Shakespeare mentioned animal bones which were used as early lace making tools. A lace ruff took 3,400 hours to complete making it very expensive. In the 17th century lace became a means of showing great wealth. Both men and women used it to decorate their clothes and a husband would buy his wife a piece of lace rather than jewellery. Home grown thread from Honiton was transported to London via the Great West Road. In 1839 Queen Victoria wore a Honiton Lace wedding gown. Anyone taking tea with the Queen was expected to wear a piece of lace. The display of handmade lace articles and photos that Pat brought along was amazing, including a photo of the lace christening dress worn by Queen Victoria's first child and passed down to generations. On display was a picture of the Prince of Whale's feathers, Jabots made for the House of Commons, and a letter of thanks Pat received from Betty Boothroyde for a Jabot and cuffs which took immense hours of work. From 1870 there was a decline of the industry, by 1939 only 9 lace makers remained. Pat made lace for Buckingham Palace, met most of the Royals, took tea in the House of Commons, gave talks in the U.S.A. Germany, France and Switzerland and featured in television shows including Victorian and Edwardian Farm with Ruth Goodman. We thanked her for visiting our little group. Maybe Chideock W.I. might visit Honiton in the near future?

After tea Iris Jones gave a delegate's report of the Dorset Federation Centenary A.G.M. in Poole where the Chideock W.I. Banner was paraded by out Secretary Ros Hipkiss. The Craft group are preparing for the Bridport Christmas Tree festival and the Chideock Christmas Fayre on 9th Dec. Members of the Book Group went to hear Author Tracy Chevalier speak about her latest book. We are all looking forward to our W.I. Christmas Lunch and the Centenary Carol Service at Wimborne Minster. Planning now for "Another Chideock Dorset New Year" on January 13.th Watch out for the posters and be sure to get your tickets as this has proved to be very popular in the past.

This is the last year of the competition as Dorset Wildlife Trust after 20 + years have lost the funding to support the judging for the event but we will still try retain their accreditation for being 'wildlife friendly' in the future. In 2017-18 the emphasis is on identifying and if required protecting significant trees in the Dorset Landscape. The two elderly Yews and the Phyllarea in the front of the church are in the significant category for their size/age and rarity.

CHIDEOCK BYPASS WORKING GROUP

Proposed Low Emission Zone for Chideock Research Paper and Conclusions

Summary

While a Low Emission Zone (LEZ) may suit other areas of the UK such as big cities, Chideock has a unique topography and is one of the major pinch points along the A35, one of the 18 key strategic routes in England. Ten key issues have been identified that have to be resolved before a LEZ could be considered as a viable proposition for Chideock, namely:

- Where does the traffic go?
- What charges and penalties will be set?
- What exemptions will apply to local residents?
- What happens to Heavy Goods Vehicles?
- How will the local farming community be affected?
- Will motorcycles get charged or fined?
- Can modified vehicles be identified?
- What about illegally modified vehicles?
- What will happen to foreign registered vehicles? and
- Will vehicles be checked before they enter the LEZ?

Six alternative routes have been identified but only one is considered remotely viable and this would divert traffic round the LEZ via the A37 from Dorchester to Yeovil. The route would then follow the A30, A3088, A303 and A30 to Honiton. This was the preferred route put forward in the 2002 plan by the Highways Agency (predecessor of Highways England) but the A37 is not currently designated as a trunk road. The route would add approximately 25 miles to the journey and take around an hour longer, thereby adding to transport costs and deterring visitors.

Pollution is not the only problem facing Chideock. Introducing a LEZ will not solve the problems of some of the most dangerous airborne pollutants generated by traffic. Neither will it solve the problems of noise pollution, vibration, safety, quality of life and the protection of a unique medieval village. Chideock residents live under the constant threat of traffic accidents, in particular the catastrophic potential of out of control HGVs destroying the centre of the village. What is quite clear is that none of our local elected representatives or Highways England have any idea where the traffic would go after implementing a LEZ!

Chideock Parish Council News.

Parish Poll.

Whilst the Parish Council does not wish to enter discussion regarding the recent Parish Poll and the questions posed, it is noted that the figure of 82% (or 78.89% as there were 155 Yes votes and 199 ballot papers issued), which has been quoted as the percentage in

favour of a bypass outside the Parish boundary, is misleading. There were 534 eligible voters and of these 29.03% voted in favour of this option. The remaining 70.97% either did not vote, voted against the question, or the vote was "Void for uncertainty".

The Parish Council has received an invoice from West Dorset District Council for £850.70, with payment required in April 2018. This deferment means that the amount can be included in the budget for 2018 - 2019, which forms the basis for determining the Parish precept.

A35 Resurfacing.

Balfour Beatty / Connect have confirmed that, subject to resolving some contractual issues with Highways England, they will be undertaking drainage repairs in the Spring of 2018, and will be resurfacing the carriageway through the village in September 2018.

Come and Have Your Say at a Parish Council Meeting.

The Parish Council exists to represent **YOU**, the residents of Chideock, Seatown and most of North Chideock, and is funded by a small part of the Council Tax which you pay. There is a "Democratic Period" at every meeting. So, if you have got something on your mind which you think the Parish Council should know about and / or do something about, then come along and tell councillors about it. The matter may be considered at the appropriate point on the agenda for the meeting, or at a subsequent meeting.

Parish Councils have few powers, but they can, and do, try to get those who do have the powers to do what needs to be done.

During the winter Chideock Parish Council is meeting at 10:00 am on the last Tuesday of the month but the meetings will be at 7 pm when the lighter evenings are with us again. There is no meeting in August or December.

Vegetation Obscuring Road Signs or Overhanging Footways and Roads.

A reminder that it is the responsibility of the owner or occupier of land or property to ensure that vegetation growing on their land does not obscure any road traffic sign nor impede vehicles and pedestrians.

Clearing vegetation near a road, ditch, brook or river.

Please ensure that any bushes / trees / brambles etc. overhanging pavements / footpaths are cut back to allow pedestrians to safely walk along without going onto the highway to avoid this vegetation (This is particularly necessary on narrow lanes without footways.)


Also, please make sure that, when strimming banks or pruning hedges / trees close to a

Also, please make sure that, when strimming banks or pruning hedges / trees close to a public highway, ditch, brook or river, all detritus is removed and not allowed to block up drains, gullies and culverts or fall into the ditch, brook or river.

Clear a Drain!

When you are out walking on any of the side roads and you see a drain blocked or partially blocked by leaves, mud or other debris then please give it a bit of a clean with your boot or stick. DCC Highways are doing their best but there are an awful lot of drains in Dorset, not to mention potholes etc.

If you think that the drain is blocked inside or find another Highway problem then let DCC Highways know, either by phone on 01305 221020 or via the dorsetforyou.com website, or contact a member of the Flood Group or the Clerk. **Do not attempt to clear blocked drains on the A35**. 
