ENLIGHTENMENT!

I recently preached a Sermon at St Giles Chideock on "Enlightenment". Several people suggested afterwards that I might share what I said in "Chideock News", as it might be of wider interest. So here is my 'reworked' Article, for your own enlightenment!

The word "Enlightenment" means for many people a reference to a particular period of European history when philosophers began to use the power of rationalism to critique what they regarded as the superstitious beliefs and practices of religion. They wanted to free people from the dark ages of blind belief and enable them to be enlightened with a philosophy of life that was more carefully reasoned. Many might say that this process has continued ever since and needs to be applied across all beliefs and cultures in the world. My view upon this is that the truth claims of Christianity do need to be rigorously evaluated – and a rational as well as spiritual basis for our faith developed. However, the term "enlightenment" is now more frequently used to describe the spiritual goal of all truly spiritual religions. Eastern religions such as Buddhism and Hinduism think of it as the awakening of the soul, for example to:

- ~ The essential truth of our life; based upon the reality of what truly IS eternal;
- ~ The sense of our mystical one-ness with all living things within the cosmos;
- $\sim\,$ The knowledge of how we can be released from the world of material appearances.

The practices of eastern religions, such as yoga, meditation and mindfulness can help achieve this.

Christians also seek enlightenment and share many of the same objectives as I've listed above. But there are also some fundamental differences, which revolve around our belief in Jesus Christ as 'light for the world'. It is through a personal relationship with Jesus that we become enlightened as to our true nature and destiny. The process of illumination is initiated and aided by God's Spirit, who leads us into an ever-fuller experience of divine love. As St Paul expresses it – enlightenment comes through the veil of obscurity being lifted, gradually, by the grace of God.

St Paul experienced the veil of physical and spiritual blindness being lifted, though his famous 'Damascus Road' experience. He gained enlightenment in every sense when prayed for by Ananias, and as the Holy Spirit came powerfully upon him. This gave him clear sight of God and His will for Paul's life. This experience transformed his life, instilling in him fresh purpose, as a foremost Apostle. He taught through his various Letters about how we might also gain enlightenment as Christians.

Achieving enlightenment does not come without a great deal of desire and effort – as adherents of all religions certainly agree. Christians believe that we need to undertake various spiritual disciplines and practices to stir up God's grace to bring it about. These include the traditional Lenten disciplines of prayer and meditation, fasting and abstinence, reading and reflection. The path to enlightenment also requires positive actions, such as compassionate care for all in need, generosity in sharing of our wealth with others and thoughtfully kind words that will encourage others in their enlightenment.

The reward: More expansive vision of the glory of God and God's Creation in our own enlightenment.

Chideock WI News, March 2018

In February we welcomed Denys Brunsden as our speaker who gave us and a number of interested visitors a very interesting talk about the Chideock Cider Makers, placing the history of the Cider Shed at Silverbridge Farm within the wider context of the history of apple orchard growing, which comes to us from the Puritans. He told us they were land improvers and saw the creation of orchards as a way of improving the rural economy and as a measure of the beauty and wealth of a village. At one time there were 16 orchards in Chideock and originally 13 cider presses. Of those the sole survivor is the press at Silverbridge. The Manor recipe which the Cider Makers use is

the only remaining complete recipe. Chideock cider made from this recipe is described as "challenging"! It is very dry. There are traditions associated with cider making. It was part of a man's pay: "a good home and free cider". In the last 30 years the Shed has raised some £50,000 for local charities. Denys showed us a film made by Abbie Stewart which featured The Farm, The Shed, the cider making process and the Cider Makers. Abbie is one of a younger generation interested in the traditions. Asked if he thought the tradition would survive, Denys said that had he been asked that question a few years ago he would not have been optimistic but there are now a few younger people involved and it is possible the traditions may survive to the next generation. The Cider Makers look to the future planting six new apple trees each year. At tea time we were able to sample the cider and the cider vinegar made at the Shed. Both are available for a donation on Sundays from 12 till 1.00 pm. Long may the traditions contribute to the wealth and beauty of our village!

We were pleased to welcome three new members this month.

Everyone in the village agrees that the Church is a fine old building. It has always been there, far longer than any of us can remember. It is the centre of our village; it signifies permanence in an ever-changing world. We couldn't imagine Chideock without the church at its heart. Where would we have our many local baptisms, weddings and funerals without it? But how many of us, as we pass by, stop to think what its upkeep involves?

Then there is the essential quinquennial inspection. Every five years the building is inspected and a list of obligatory maintenance and repairs is drawn up. This may come to many thousands of pounds. All this money has to be found, just to maintain the building, churchyard and cemetery. It does not include the £19,000 cost of administration and Clergy.

With only about 22 regular churchgoers you may well ask "How on earth do we raise all that money?"

Despite all the events run by The Friends of St. Giles and the PCC such as quizzes, lunches, coffee mornings, occasional concerts, teas and more, we have difficulty in meeting our yearly commitments. None of our events would raise any funds if it wasn't for the generous support of the villagers. We sincerely thank you for all your help but you can see from this letter how difficult it is to keep our church in good repair.

If you are able to make a small regular commitment or a one-off donation, it would be an enormous help in keeping our church building beautiful for the future. St. Giles Church PCC

A35 Community Severance and Road Safety Issues.

The Parish Council has been advised that WSP UK Limited has been commissioned by Highways England to undertake a Feasibility Study for improvements to the A35 in Chideock.

The study will consider **community severance and road safety issues** relating to the operation of the A35 through the village. This will form the basis for appropriate recommendations to be made in relation to **improvements within the 30mph speed limit area of the village in terms of vehicle speeds, pedestrian / cycle facilities (including crossings), junction improvements, and other measures such as signs / markings improvements.**

Please send comments / concerns / opinions about this area of the highway network, with reference to vehicle speeds, road safety and severance issues, to the Clerk, who will collate the responses and send them to WSP.

Please note that pollution, road surface issues and potholes are NOT part of the scope.

Further information will be published when it is available.

HE RIS2 Public Consultation

It is a statement from the Chideock Bypass Working Group concerning the Public Consultation recently sought by Highways England for their Road Investment Strategy 2..

To All Chideock Villagers

As you may be aware Highways England (HE) have just closed a Public Consultation period for their Road Investment Strategy 2 (RIS2) seeking public opinion on works to be included in their investment budget for the Strategic Road Network (SRN) for the years 2020 - 2025.

The Chideock Bypass Working Group (CBWG) feel passionately that the A35 Trunk Road (which forms a part of the SRN) has suffered from years of underinvestment which has adversely affected not only our village of Chideock but also the thousands of vehicles that use the A35 every day of the year. We feel that all these road users have been affected not only in the very obvious ways of traffic congestion and road incidents but also in the less obvious ways of air pollution and impacts on the local economy.

Therefore CBWG prepared and submitted a response to HE's request for Public Consultation putting the case for a Chideock Bypass to be included within their budget for works in the period 2020-2025.

TRADING STANDARDS ...

One million 'Friends' by 2020

A call to action for individuals, communities, businesses, neighbours and work colleagues to help 'take a stand against scams' has just been announced by the Government. The Friends Against Scams campaign, supported by Dorset County Council trading standards to help people spot and report scams, aims to train up to a million people to be Friends Against Scams by 2020.

Since its launch last year the Friends Against Scams campaign has already provided training to more than 30,000 people, helping them understand how to spot a scam and empowering them to help others from becoming victims.

Scams affect many people and anyone can be caught out by a scam. It is believed that only about 5% of scams are reported and it is therefore seen very much as a silent hidden crime. Victims can lose thousands of pounds, not just

as a one of loss, often small amounts quickly add up to more substantial losses over many years.

You can support the Friends Against Scams campaign by completing a short awareness training session in person or online. The training gives you the confidence to spot and deal with scams yourself and to talk with and support others more confidently about scams.

Those who want to can take further steps to become a SCAMchampion by hosting awareness sessions to recruit Friends and driving Friends Against Scams forward in their communities. You could sign your company or organisation up to the campaign and train staff to become Friends Against Scams. Public figures can become a SCAMbassador by using their influence to raise the profile of scams at a national level.


