CHIDEOCK WI

October 2018

On 2nd October, we welcomed Neil Lovesey from Picket Lane Nursery, South Perrott, who told us about the only known species, apart from human beings, which harvests crops to feed livestock to



feed the family.... BEES. In his beautifully illustrated talk, The Bee Friendly Garden, he introduced us to the life habits of some of the 140 known species of bee, without which we would lose 65% of all our foods. It is impossible to summarise all he told us in this most interesting talk. He alerted us to the threat to the European bee - in an effort to increase honey production - of the introduction of the Asian bee to our habitats; and alerted us to the giant hornet, up to 3.5 inches long, which has fairly recently reached our island endangering insects, birds and small mammals. His description of the work of a colony of bees, not least the contrasting roles of the males (drones) and the females (workers) drew some laughter, but this all led into the importance of a good supply of nectar and how we can promote this, and a good habitat for bees, in our gardens. If you have a water feature of any kind, place a sponge in it as a source of water for bees. Any plant that produces seeds is right for bees but the message was to ensure your garden has a good supply from the helibores, wood anemones and snowdrops in the spring right through to the ivy flowers of the autumn. There was the opportunity to buy bee friendly plants grown by Neil.

Our speaker on November 6th is Zanna Hoskins of Champernhayes Flowers - whose "pop-up" shop you may remember in East St. last year. She will demonstrate making an informal posy and a Christmas wreath. Visitors are most welcome.

Kate Geraghty 1940 - 2018

Chideock Parish Council.

Kate Geraghty was the longest serving member of the Parish Council in recent times. Her 25 years of sterling service to the community as a councillor was unstinting and unmatched for commitment and energy, passion and compassion, determination and persistence, professionalism and leadership. The current 2015 - 2019 council is the seventh Kate served in since first becoming a councillor in 1993 and it is a mark of her dogged insistence in seeing things through that she died in service. She was never one to give up or give in, and it is a tribute to her courage in the face of her illness, over the past years, that she carried on when many would have given up long ago.

The Parish has seen some very significant changes over the past quarter century, and Kate served through them all, without fear or favour, always at the forefront of the main events and debates. Her policies were always clearly and coherently argued, with deep feeling, and she uncompromisingly defended the rights of the local community and the local environment.

She championed the right of local people to walk safely along Mill Lane Bridleway 18, endlessly badgering Dorset County Council to erect the appropriate signs to protect pedestrians and to clarify the status of the bridleway as a Public Right of Way for horse riders, walkers and non-mechanically propelled vehicles – a battle which is still on-going.

Kate was instrumental in the restoration of the children's play area at Clapps Mead in the late 1990s including the installation of a commemorative stone to acknowledge the Grafton family's gift of Clapps Mead in 1938, to be held in perpetuity for the benefit of the community and the children of the village.

The Chideock Society.

Kate brought the same qualities to the Chideock Society. She was a founder member and she served on the Committee from the very beginnings in 1989.

Over the years she has been instrumental in bringing many community projects to fruition and has arranged many events and outings for members.

Recent events include: Kate Adie with Women in World War 1; Paul Atterbury "Behind the Scenes at the Antiques Roadshow"; Colin Varndell's wonderful photographs; Robin Marshall-Ball and the River Winniford voles; and many more.

One project was the book "A Wander through Chideock" which was produced to commemorate the Millennium.

Another was the planting of saplings on the East Cliff to replace lost hedgerows and provide green corridors for wildlife.

But perhaps her greatest achievement with the Chideock Society was applying for a government Coastal Revival Fund grant to undertake a feasibility study of what could be done to regenerate Seatown. The bid was successful, the study was carried out with input from the community and many other stakeholders, and significant improvements have taken place at Seatown – additional rock armour to protect the turning circle and improved signage being the most significant to date. Also, official passing places are to be constructed on Sea Hill Lane by Dorset Highways before next year's holiday season, to improve traffic flow.

So, when you are at Seatown, look around and remember Kate Geraghty.

He attends and sits prominently front and centre and when their eyes meet, Edward and Florence shed silent tears of regret.

TRADING STANDARDS

New nuisance calls measures

Rogue companies making unsolicited calls related to personal injury claims could now be fined up to £500,000.

New powers which came into force on 8 September give consumers the choice to 'opt-in' to receive these calls, and people being harassed by nuisance calls now have new powers to stop them

Cold calls offering to help claim compensation for mis-sold payment protection insurance (PPI) will be banned if the claimant has not chosen to 'opt-in' to receive them.

Previously people had to 'opt-out' of receiving such calls by registering with the free Telephone Preference Service or withdraw their consent while on the call. However, the new powers will force the caller to make the necessary checks to make sure they have the recipient's consent before calling.

Those offering unwanted claims management services could be fined as much as half a million pounds by the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) if they breach the rules.

The Financial Conduct Authority highlighted that in the last 12 months, approximately 2.7 billion unsolicited calls, texts and emails were made to the UK's adult population offering to help them make a claim. This includes calls about recent accidents or mis-sold PPI. This is equivalent to approximately 50 calls, texts or emails being made to every member of the adult population.

Individuals can opt-in to receiving these calls by consenting to be contacted by claims companies when enquiring about settling a claim, or when seeking claims advice.

These new measures together with the strengthened Data Protection Act, will curb the number of nuisance calls received by consumers.

If you receive nuisance calls you can report it to the ICO who may investigate and take action against those responsible. The Government has already made it easier for regulators to fine those breaching direct marketing rules, by forcing companies to display their number when calling customers and there are increased fines for wrongdoers.
