Tony Fuller 1933-2021

Percival Anthony Fuller, better known as Tony. A man I knew of through our wives rather than knew but discovered that strangely we had places and people in our past that linked us. Tony was born to poor parents at The Middlesex Hospital, a place I was to know well in later life. Tony's early years were very hard until he was evacuated to Swyre during the Second World War where life here was a revelation and he flourished. He was later to return to Swyre, a place which was always special to him for the rest of his life. Tony had, had hard start in life with many ups and downs until he met and married Pam. Not everything was rosy, but they had many good, fun years together.

Pam & Tony moved to Chideock in 2002. It was sometime after this that we met up at Chideock village hall at one of the many lunches or such like. We got talking like old men do, he happened to mention the Bristol Unicorn's a youth marching band, my mistake was to reply "Oh! I know of them. My son was in a marching band which competed against them and won on one occasion." Then the conversation started when, where and how? It transpired that we both attended many band competitions during in the 1980's, either supporting each other's band or me in an official capacity policing the event. Feelings could run high with up to a thousand young and high spirted band's people with their supporters. Pam was always at the competitions with her majorettes giving support and encouragement to the Band. While in Bristol Tony set-up A One Hundred Club and raised many thousands of pounds for the Bristol Unicorn Band.

It is Tony that we have to thank, for setting up the Chideock One Hundred Club in 2012 which is still running today, and the funds raised support local projects.

Tony like to write; he wrote and published the story of his life, but dear to his heart was writing poetry. I am sure many of us have a book of his poems on a shelf somewhere and the recent one he wrote for the Chideock WI's 100th anniversary has gone Dorset-wide, if not further.

In May 2010 Tony started his campaign to try and make safety changes to the A35 after many promises by local councillors and our then MP. The campaign was halted in August of that year and as we all well know the only thing that has changed on the A35 since then is the increase in the volume of traffic, but it is surprising how many people visiting still ask if this is the village where a man brought traffic to a halt for miles!

Both Pam & Tony were very active in Chideock. Pam was an active member of the Theatre Club, served on the Village Hall Committee, assisted with the fortnightly Bingo and was on the WI Committee, as well as a reliable pair of



hands member ofthe Friends of St Giles Church, willing to help wherever she could. Tony was a willing door keeper at Village Hall or the Friends of St Giles events and running raffles. If ever there was an opportunity to raise money for a good cause Tony would be there to put his shoulder to the wheel. Both Pam and Tony were great supporters of the Chideock Society and regular church wherever goers; Pam was, Tony

would not be far behind supporting and vice versa. It was a sad night in early 2020 when I drove Pam and Tony to the Hospice in Dorchester where Pam

sadly lost her fight with cancer. Tony was not in good health himself but after this the light went out of Tony's life. May they both rest in peace.

As a way of welcoming, you back and to thank you for your continued support, we are offering a discount of almost 50% on hire fees until the end of May 2022. Hall hire is reduced to £14 a session (from £27) and kitchen hire charges have been halved. This has been made possible by grants received form Dorset Council.

In addition, a grant from the Parish Council, as well as donations from people within the village, have enabled us to continue with a programme of maintenance and improvements, securing the hall's future for years to come as well as making it a more welcoming venue.

The Council continues to lobby various individuals, organisations, and bodies regarding the A35 issues experienced by the village.

Parish Council Meetings are now being held in-person at the Village Hall. The Parish Council will follow the COVID-19 instructions issued by the Village Hall Management Committee, together with 2 metre social distancing and the wearing of face coverings.

Vegetation Overhanging Footways and Watercourses.

A reminder that it is the responsibility of the owner or occupier of land or property to ensure that

- a) vegetation growing on their land does not impede pedestrians using a footway of any kind
- b) vegetation growing on their land does not restrict visibility for pedestrians and drivers
- c) vegetation growing on their land does not overhand the carriageway where there is no footway
- d) vegetation or other material from their land does not in any way impede the flow of water. This includes anything overhanging the watercourse which could, in severe weather, trap material being carried downstream.

In addition, please ensure that vegetation trimmings are not left on a footway or carriageway of any kind nor allowed to fall into a watercourse.

Planning Applications - Neighbour notification letters

The following information has been received from Dorset Council.

"In line with the Council's agreed Statement of Community Involvement, from 1 July onwards we will no longer be sending neighbour notification letters for planning applications, unless these are specifically required by legislation.

All applications will continue to be publicised via site notices, and press notices will also be used where required by law. Details of all applications will still be published online, and we will continue to consult statutory organisations and town and parish councils.

This change will mean that we continue to meet our statutory requirements, applications continue to be publicised via site notice, and the planning teams can focus on clearing the backlog of planning applications."

Dorset Local Plan.

The following update has been received from Dorset Council.

"The first consultation for the Dorset Council Local Plan took place earlier this year and received over 60,000 comments via the web form, posted paper copies or via email, around 7,000 individuals responded. There was a good cross section of residents from all age groups, from 11 years old to 85 years old.

All the comments are being considered within the framework set by National Planning Policy which informs all planning decisions. We aim to publish the comments on the consultation in July.

The Dorset Council Local Plan contains strategies to shape the area over a 17-year period. These include planning growth in the right places at the right time, maximising the supporting infrastructure secured through development, boosting the local economy, and protecting the high-quality local environment. Without a plan, and an ability to show that it has a five-year supply of land for development, the council is open to challenge from developers who would then be able to build homes in unplanned locations potentially harming our high-quality environment."

The timeline for the production of the first Dorset Council Local Plan is:

Stages 1 to 3

- Prepare a consultation plan from previous work and gathered evidence.
- Consultation January 2021 Complete

Stage 4

- Review the consultation responses, gather the necessary evidence, and review the local plan
- March 2021 to January 2022 underway

Stages 5 and 6

- Prepare the submission version of the plan and supporting material and submit to the Secretary of State for examination in public
- May to October 2022

Stages 7 and 8

- Public examination by planning inspector
- 2022/2023

Stage 9

- Plan is adopted and used as part of the development plan
- 2023
