

Dear Neighbours

It's a great privilege to have such a wonderful place as St Giles' Church to celebrate the seasons and hold our Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals, with its fascinating history, and its chiming bells.

But St Giles' is an old building, and its fabric needs upkeep. Every five years an architect's report tells us what repairs have to be done: replacing broken tiles or mullion windows; securing the grotesques on the bell tower; clearing gutters; repainting rainwater goods - to name just a few.

The day-to-day running costs of our Grade 1 listed building include insurance of about \pounds 3,500 a year; and utility bills of over \pounds 2,000 a year.

On top of all this we have to contribute to the Diocese of Salisbury for the costs of our clergy.

All of this has to be paid for by our congregation, with the support of the Friends of St Giles.

Even though the lifting of Covid restrictions means we are again able to hold fundraising events, including our popular quiz nights, our costs continue to increase (just like everyone else's), leaving us short of funds.

Last year you responded most generously to an appeal to support the maintenance of St Giles' Church, and we are reaching out to you again for your help.

After a very hot and dry summer the weather has well and truly broken with much needed rain for the garden. Our speaker, Ambra Edwards, provided and enlightening talk on the history of plant hunting and its influences on today's gardens. For those of us with gardens many of our much-loved plants come from around the globe and how these came to be here was deftly illustrated.

We were delighted to visit Chideock Museum, located at Chideock Catholic Church, to see the new display charting the history of Chideock WI from its



inception to present day. Diane Benjamin has worked hard on archiving the documents held by the WI and, together with Lee Ramsden, has provided both a remarkable display and a wealth of information. Please do take the trouble to look at the WI corner when visiting the Museum.

Key members of the team, with Diane in the centre, who helped create prepare the display corner and assemble the documents.

As always, The Book Club had a lively debate on the merits of 'Grandmothers' by Salley Vickers. Most members enjoyed the book although in some parts it was felt that the plot

was a little too contrived. Interest was awakened by the detailed references to Weymouth and the diversity of characterization. Many members of the group enjoyed 'Down Cemetery Road' by Mick Herron whilst others struggled to engage with the book from the outset; a little perseverance is needed! Both the Bridport and Yeovil Literary Festivals were discussed and it was agreed members would make their own bookings. The group will meet in The George 12.00 on 10th October when they will be discussing 'The Memory Keeper of Kiev' by Erin Litteken. It was agreed that the group would choose different novels by Rosie Thomas for discussion on November 14th.

The Walking Group took a gentle stroll around North Chideock ending in the Catholic Church to have a peak at the WI corner. There would not be a walk in September.

In August, the Lunch and Natter Group had a pleasant lunch at The Marquis of Lorne. In respect for the Funeral of the late Queen the lunch on 19th September was cancelled.

Members of The Craft Group have been busy making cards and continue to meet regularly. Their next meeting is 25th October when they will be making quilted tree decorations.

The WI's stall at Clapps Mead Meadow Fete did well with the cakes section being a 'sellout'. Money raised is being given to a new Ukrainian Family, shortly to arrive, who will be staying with another of our members.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday 4th October at 2.00pm. Our speaker will be Nick Phillips of Chideock Champignons. We are hoping third time lucky for this event which has had to be postponed on two occasions!

THE AUTUMN SEASON

As the seasons turn, Autumn is the busiest for St Giles Wildlife Churchyard. The last burst of the year's growth is emerging from the summer drought, assisted by recent thunderstorms, so there is much to be done collecting up and taking away prunings, trimmings, and cuttings. Anyone who can help will be most welcome.

The basic plan for re-establishing the Wildlife Churchyard is beginning to emerge. A perimeter path has been cut, and the whole area inside and outside of it has been raked, strimmed and then cut with Shay's mighty ride-on mower. Edges of graves have been picked out, and some new edged graves have emerged from the long grass. Perhaps a feature can be made of these by planting wild flowers inside.

It is hoped to sow Yellow Rattle to control the long grasses, and my experience of the test areas in my own garden is that this will take 2-3 years. In the meantime, it is hoped that the primroses will survive through to Spring 2023, and we can see where to go from there.

The wild margins have been cleared, right up to the churchyard walls, and much of jeanette Smith's planting has been revealed, so there is a pattern to be re-established, and any donations of plants or cuttings will be most appreciated, such as St John's Wort (Hypericum), Loosestrife (Lysimachias), Leopard's Bane (Doronicum), Michaelmas Daisies, or the like, will be much appreciated.

A season's strong growth of long grass, Teazel and Columbine has been cleared behind the Memory Stones, so the back two rows have emerged. Jeanette's planting of Tamarisk, Hebe, Rose Bay Willow Herb and Wild Sweet Pea have been revealed, along with her planting of perennials on both sides of the seat in the north west corner, so there is actually a good basis on which to build now that the overgrowth is cleared.

Along the west wall Jeanette's tiles and stones have re-appeared with some holes and burrows indicating some wildlife activity. Nearby, bees were busy tending their aphids, and there are two families of slow worms in grave edges in the north west corner beginning to make their shallow burrows in preparation for Winter hibernation.

The two Rowan trees are heavy with bright red Autumn berries, and a pleasure to behold. Over the past year the churchyard has not been a pleasure to walk in. It is the aim of the Wildlife Project Team to make a churchyard in 2023 which is a real pleasure to walk in, or sit in and enjoy swathes of colourful wild flowers.

Please note that the Clerk works 30 hours per month so may not respond immediately. The Council continues to lobby various individuals, organisations, and bodies regarding the A35 issues experienced by the village.

Parish Council Meetings are now in-person at the Village Hall. The next 2 meetings are at 10am on Tuesday 25 October and on Tuesday 29 November. No meeting is held in December though it may be necessary to hold a Planning Committee meeting.

An urgent PLEA to all residents.

The drains on the A35 have recently been cleared, and Dorset Highways will come and clear any blocked drains on side roads which are reported to them. **WE CAN ALL HELP TO KEEP THE DRAINS CLEAR!**

Pick up hedge clippings and similar matter so that it doesn't get washed into the road and then into the drains.

If you have a gravelled drive please take precautions so that gravel does not get onto the road and then into the drains.

If you are a farmer, lease out your land to farmers, or employ subcontractors to farm your land, please remind them of their obligations under Section 149 of the Highways Act 1980

"if anything is deposited on the highway so as to constitute a nuisance / danger the Highway Authority can require the person who put it there to remove it forthwith."

If the deposit causes an accident then an offence has been committed and farmers / operators may be prosecuted. Punishments under the Highways Act 1980 and the Road Traffic Act 1988 range from fines to imprisonment.

Are you worried about possible pollution of the River Winniford, both from upstream and from the sewage overflow discharge pipe 220m upstream from the beach? Some of you may recently have seen an article in Lyme Online about the Charmouth Lower River Char community project. This project was set up in early 2022 by a group of residents concerned about the levels of pollution and sewage run off from local roads, sewage works and farms. The initiative is supported by the Parish Council but is not run by them. The project group has successfully secured funding from the Wessex Water Foundation via Dorset Community Foundation. The Charmouth group is working with the Char Valley parish community group project for the upper Char, and with the Dorset Wildlife Trust and Dorset AONB.

Lyme Regis also has a similar group.

Chideock Parish Council asks if members of the community would like to form a similar group for the River Winniford? Clearly, Chideock and Seatown have the same issues as Charmouth, and the Parish Council has recently contacted several agencies responsible for the Winniford to get as much information as possible. In order to gain funding, the group must be independent of the Parish Council although of course we would offer assistance.

Thank you to the 3 people who have shown an interest in becoming involved - a few more would be good!

<u>REMINDER of the Rural Crime "drop in" session with Dorset Police – for residents, landowners, and farmers.</u>

Rural crime (for example theft of heating oil from farms and private residents, and of machinery) is likely to rise due to the current economic situation.

A "drop in" session with Dorset Police has been arranged for Saturday 22nd October from 3pm to 5 pm at Felicity's Farm Shop. The location has been chosen because people from Char Valley parish (which includes Morecombelake, Whitchurch Canonicorum and Wootton Fitzpaine) are also invited.

The police will give advice on measures which can be taken to prevent such thefts.

Vegetation Overhanging Footways and Watercourses.

A reminder that it is the responsibility of the owner or occupier of land or property to ensure that

- a) vegetation growing on their land does not impede pedestrians using a footway of any kind
- b) vegetation growing on their land does not restrict visibility for pedestrians and drivers
- c) vegetation growing on their land does not overhand the carriageway where there is no footway
- d) vegetation or other material from their land does not in any way impede the flow of water, which includes anything overhanging the watercourse which could, in severe weather, trap material being carried downstream.

In addition, please ensure that vegetation trimmings are not left on a footway or carriageway of any kind nor allowed to fall into a watercourse.

I am sorry to say, The Queen is dead But long live the King


