Winniford River Action Group (WRAG)

What is the highest level of E.coli found in the River Winniford at Seatown? What are Riverfly and why are they so important? Who is responsible for the health of the River Winniford? Are there other groups in the area monitoring the local rivers? These are some of the questions we were able to answer at our first Public Meeting in February.

We were delighted that so many people came along to find out more about WRAG. We were keen to update residents on what we had been doing during the last year and gave an illustrated presentation on our aims, the state of our finances and the tests that we are carrying out and results of this testing. We were able to highlight the fact that we had found a leaking sewerage pipe that was contaminating the river and that Wessex Water had rapidly attended to make a temporary repair. Our testing shows that the levels of E.coli and Enterococci in the river are still very high, particularly near the lagoon at Seatown and we will continue to monitor this situation and liaise with Wessex Water

A local retired vet, John Kenward, gave a short talk on the dangers of the chemicals used in dog and cat flea collars and treatments and their effects on the environment and water courses in particular. He encouraged us to try to reduce their use by being very diligent around the home, keeping animal bedding washed and upholstery well hoovered.

We finished the evening with a free glass of wine and an opportunity to chat further about the state of our river.

If anyone would like to watch the presentation that we gave at the meeting we hope it will shortly be on the Chideock and Seatown website under Groups/WRAG.

The Council continues to lobby various individuals, organisations, and bodies regarding the A35 issues experienced by the village.

Parish Council Meetings are in-person at the Village Hall at 10 am on the last Tuesday of each month except August and December. The next Parish Council meeting is 30 April.

Elections for all Parish / Town Councils in the Dorset Council area, Dorset Council itself, and the Police and Crime Commissioner will be held on 2 May 2024.

Nomination forms are now available at https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/media/3444

They can be submitted to Dorset Council after March 11th, which is when the formal Notice of Election will be made.

The Clerk has a copy of the Chideock Electoral Roll and can supply the necessary elector reference numbers for prospective candidates and their nominators.

Do you enjoy living in Chideock, and would you like to play a part in decision making for the village? If so, have you considered becoming a Parish Councillor? The council needs a good mix of people living or working in the parish; 18 years and over, working age, or retired.

Do you possess any, all or some of the following skills?

Good at mediation, forward thinking, like helping others, enjoy lively debate, can make awkward decisions without fear or favour, interested in learning how some of our lives are run by others, have a large amount of common sense, and can agree to disagree with others who may not share your views?

If your answer is YES to any of the above, why not share your skills to benefit the village? A Parish Council has few powers but is how those who do have power can be contacted and chased up on their responsibilities to their communities.

Chideock Parish Council usually meets once a month; extra meetings are only called over an urgent matter. Meetings are held at 10 am on the last Tuesday of the month. No meeting is held in August or December unless an urgent issue arises.

Training is provided by the Dorset Association of Parish and Town Councils and expenses are paid for travel costs made on behalf of the Parish Council.

Why not attend a council meeting? The next Parish Council meeting is at 10 am on 26 March.

Vegetation Overhanging Footways and Watercourses.

A reminder that it is the responsibility of the owner or occupier of land or property to ensure that: -

- a) vegetation growing on their land does not impede pedestrians using a footway of any kind.
- b) vegetation growing on their land does not restrict visibility for pedestrians and drivers.
- c) vegetation growing on their land does not overhand the carriageway where there is no footway.
- d) vegetation or other material from their land does not in any way impede the flow of water, which includes anything overhanging the watercourse which could, in severe weather, trap material being carried downstream.

In addition, please ensure that vegetation trimmings are not left on a footway or carriageway of any kind nor allowed to fall into a watercourse.

Trading Standards news

Burning solid fuel

Harmful levels of air pollution can damage people's health and reduce their quality of life. We can all be affected by this, but some, especially children, older people, and those with respiratory problems, can be affected most.

The Air Quality (Domestic Solid Fuels Standards) (England) Regulations 2020 brought in rules to protect health and the environment by restricting the sale of wet wood, which when burnt, produces more tiny particles than seasoned or dry wood. These particles are so tiny that they can enter the bloodstream which can potentially cause serious health issues for those most susceptible to them.

Today wood fuel can only be sold in volumes of less than 2 cubic metres if it is certified as 'Ready to Burn'. Certification confirms wood has a moisture content of 20% or less. It applies to both firewood and wood briquettes sold in single retail bags, or supplied as a bulk delivery in loose volumes. Traders are also required to store the wood in a way to prevent it being sold to customers damaged or wet.
