## **PLEA FOR HEATING 2024**

Dear Chideock Villagers

As you know, we have a beautiful Grade 1 Listed church in our village. The history of the church goes back for many years.

However, things wear out and the heating has come to the end of its life.

The Parochial Church Council has decided to update the heating using a system that will be cost effective to run, and will both protect the fabric of the church for future generations, and keep the people warm.

We are aware of the environmental costs of fossil fuels, and want to make our contribution to reduce global warming. To this end, after having considered a number of options, the PCC has decided upon an electric heating system. We have already discontinued our gas supply and switched to Britain's biggest supplier of zero-carbon electricity.

However, new heating comes at a cost. We estimate that removing the old system and installing the new will cost approximately £40,000, and we shall be holding a variety of fundraising events, and, of course, applying for grants.

Naturally, we still have to pay for the normal running of the church which comes to over £20,000 per annum. This is funded by the giving of our congregation and fundraising events. We are also supported by The Friends Of St Giles. So we need the support of the village.

The Council continues to lobby various individuals, organisations, and bodies regarding the A35 issues experienced by the village.

Parish Council Meetings are in-person at the Village Hall at 10 am on the last Tuesday of each month except August and December. The next Parish Council meetings are 30 July and 24 September. There is no meeting in August.

As I think you may know, the Clerk had a minor stroke but is on the mend and returning to duties.

### **Call for 2 Volunteers for Co-option.**

There are 3 vacancies to be filled by co-option, as only 4 people were nominated for election.

One volunteer has come forward and the co-option will be considered at the June meeting.

There will still be 2 vacancies on the council.

### **Vegetation Overhanging Footways and Watercourses.**

Please ensure that vegetation trimmings are not left on a footway or carriageway of any kind nor allowed to fall into a watercourse.

A reminder that it is the responsibility of the owner or occupier of land or property to ensure that: -

- a) vegetation growing on their land does not impede pedestrians using a footway of any kind.
- b) vegetation growing on their land does not restrict visibility for pedestrians and drivers.
- c) vegetation growing on their land does not overhand the carriageway where there is no footway.
- d) vegetation or other material from their land does not in any way impede the flow of water, which includes anything overhanging the watercourse which could, in severe weather, trap material being carried downstream..

### **CITIZEN'S ADVICE - Stopping fly-tipping together**

Trading Standards investigate doorstep crime and rogue trading. Rogue traders often don't have the necessary permissions to allow them to transport waste produced from their work. This means they are also more likely to illegally fly-tip building and garden waste somewhere, leading to a costly clean-up for other people, or for other Council services.

In the 12 months from April there were over 1700 reports of illegal fly-tips in Dorset, of which almost 800 were household related.

If you produce waste, at home or from a business, you have a legal responsibility to ensure it is disposed of legally and safely. This means making sure anyone who is handling your waste is licensed to do so. It is vital that you take steps to check that your rubbish will be disposed of correctly and that you are confident you know where it will end up.

Did you know that as a householder you can be liable if your waste is later fly-tipped? Dorset Council Environmental Enforcement Team investigate fly-tipping to identify the waste carrier and the place the waste originated from.

The Household Waste Duty of Care Regulations 2005 are not there to scare people, but to serve as a tool in the constant battle to eliminate fly-tipping and environmental crime. Put simply, if people don't pay illegal operators to take their waste, the illegal operator won't be able to fly-tip it.

Steps you can take to protect yourself include asking for the business' waste carrier licence number, don't pay cash and ask for a receipt or Waste Transfer Note. If they can't provide it, or aren't registered, then look for someone else. You can check if someone is registered first using the Environment Agency's public register <https://environment.data.gov.uk/public-register/view/search-waste-carriers-brokers> or, by calling the Environment Agency on 03708 506 506.

To be sure a trader works in a legal, honest and fair way, then think about using a Buy With Confidence Trading Standards approved trader. Search for a Buy With Confidence trader near you at [buywithconfidence.gov.uk](http://buywithconfidence.gov.uk) or by phoning the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 0808 223 1133.

## **The Church of Our Lady, Queen of Martyrs, & St Ignatius A stunning church if you have not already visited it!**

... in Chideock is situated along a quiet country lane (North Road), about a ten minute, easy walk from St Giles Church and the Weld Memorial Chapel. There is a parking area just beyond the entrance. Vigil Masses are held on 2nd and 4th Saturdays of the month at 6 pm, and every Friday at 10 a.m. Masses are attended by local people from the Bridport area and also by many people visiting this beautiful area.

Four families have held the Manor of Chideock from the Norman Conquest until the late 1990's (Mandeville, Chideock, Arundell and Weld). The Manor and estate were sold to the Coates family in 1996. The church remains in trust to the Weld family.

### **Chideock Castle**

Chideock Castle was built by John de Chideocke in 1380. In the Middle Ages, it passed into the hands of the Arundells of



Lanherne, a powerful West Country family who remained loyal to their faith when the old religion was banned. The Castle became a refuge for Catholic priests and a place where loyal Catholic villagers could go to Mass. During this time, seven Chideock men were martyred for their faith. When the Castle was destroyed in the Civil War, the Arundells left Chideock, but despite persecution, the local people kept the faith and worshipped in secret in the loft of a barn next to the present Manor House. In 1802, Thomas Weld of Lulworth Castle, a relation of the Arundells and also a member of an old Catholic family, bought Chideock estate for his sixth son, Humphrey, who built the present Manor House and turned the barn into a modest chapel. In 1874, Humphrey's son, Charles, transformed the latter into the beautiful Church we know today. The Church is dedicated to Our Lady, Queen of Martyrs and to St. Ignatius, founder of the Society of Jesus.

### **The Chideock Martyrs**

360 men and women are known to have died in England for their Catholic Faith between 1535 and 1681. Of these, eight are associated with Chideock. Seven were put to death and are known as the Chideock Martyrs. The eighth, John Jessop, died in prison. The eight brave men who died for their Catholic Faith:

**Father Thomas Pilchard** Was a Jesuit and despite being banished, in 1586 he returned to England and became Chaplain at Chideock Castle where he was concealed. While he was there, he made many converts.

**Blessed John Cornelius** Was a friend and Chaplain to the Arundells at Chideock Castle. Around Easter 1594, a servant betrayed his presence and he was arrested along with Thomas Bosgrave, a nephew of Lady Arundell, and two servants, John Carey and Patrick Salmon, all of whom had tried to save Fr. Cornelius. All four were executed at Dorchester on 4th July 1594 and beatified in 1929.

**Blessed Hugh Green** Blessed Hugh Green also became Chaplain to the Arundell family and was martyred in 1642 after being arrested at Lyme Regis as he tried to escape to France. He was beatified in 1929.

**William Pike** A carpenter in Chideock. Was put to death in Dorchester and beatified, together with Jessop, in 1987.

**Thomas Bosgrave** Nephew of Lady Arundell. Died trying to save Father Cornelius.

**John Carey and Patrick Salmon** Servants of Lady Arundell. Both died trying to save Father Cornelius.

**John Jessop** Put in prison for his faith and died there.

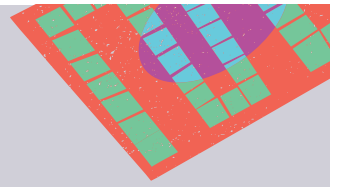

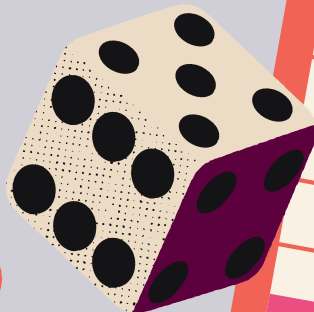
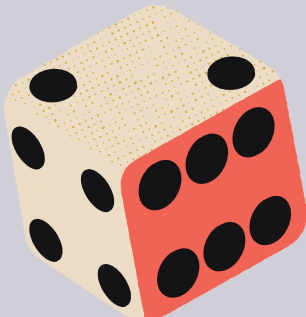
