Delivering a Project for the Future

St Giles church is a Grade 1 listed 13th century church, whose very presence in Chideock goes back generations. Although today the congregation is smaller, it remains at the beating heart of the village, providing a place for Christian celebrations, for happy and sad occasions and beautiful flower festivals. Today the history of those that have lived and continue to live in the village is celebrated both in the churchyards and in the historical documents which are kept in the church.

A year ago, the management committee of the church (the PCC), began to explore the different options to replace the old, ineffective, gas heaters that are in the St Giles. This reflected the fact that it was recognised that due to the age and size of the church, whatever new replacement heating was considered, had to be able to maintain an optimum level of heat within the building in order to maintain the fabric of the church. Otherwise, if this principal was not adhered to, then it was highly likely the building would deteriorate rapidly.

A number of different options were considered, with initially gas replacement heaters at a cost of between £20,000 to £30,000. However, the Diocese of Salisbury would not agree to this option on the basis that it was not environmentally appropriate, or carbon neutral, and therefore only those heating systems powered by electricity could be considered. Out of the remaining options, it was found that the most cost-effective, regarding maintenance and longevity, alongside maintaining an ambient temperature was the current proposal for which the PCC are now fundraising.

The cost reflects the size of the church and the fact that the replacement of heating is expensive, this can be seen just from the previous estimate to replace the old gas heaters. The chosen provider has over 40 years expertise in delivering heating systems for Grade One/Two Listed churches

The project is divided into two phases, the first part is about raising money for the actual heating system and having it installed. The second phase will be about raising funds for solar panels to be put onto the roof, which then pay for the ongoing running costs.

The PCC recognise that it is unlikely that all the funds will be raised this year. Currently, although individuals and organisations have begun to donate towards the heating replacement fund, further funds cannot be applied for by seeking grants until we have permission from the Diocese of Salisbury in the form of a Faculty. This reflects the fact that the Church of England own St Giles and as such, they have overall control over whatever changes are made to the fabric of the church. Val has been instrumental in putting together all of the paperwork and reports that are required in order to gain a Faculty which, hopefully, will be agreed at their next meeting in September. Val and Vanessa are meeting on a monthly basis to track and project management the process.

There will be further updates on the project in the coming months. If you have any questions or you wish to make donation, then please ask Val or Vanessa, Church Wardens.

A record number of members came back to the Village Hall after the summer break to meet up with friends and to hear Jake Lanning, Deputy Station Officer, HM Coastguard – West Bay tell us all about his organisation and how it operates. Jake's day job is in film and TV and his influence on the visual presentation was very obvious – nothing boring and institutional here, it really kept our attention.

Jake started by giving us some history. In 1809 the <u>Preventive Water Guard</u> was established, which may be regarded as the immediate ancestor of HM Coastguard. Its primary objective was to prevent smuggling, but it was also responsible for giving assistance to <u>shipwrecks</u>. For this reason, each Water Guard station was issued with <u>Manby's Mortar</u> (the mortar fired a shot with a line attached from the shore to the wrecked ship).

HM Coastguard was established in 1822. They have gone through a number of changes since then but now they are responsible for all maritime search and rescue and their role includes the mobilisation, organisation and tasking of adequate resources to respond to persons either in distress at sea, or to persons at risk of injury or death on the cliffs or shoreline of the United Kingdom. Since 2015 they have also been responsible for land-based search and rescue helicopter operations. It is in fact the fourth emergency service (not the AA as some would have you believe).

HM Coastguard is a government agency, responsible to the Ministry of Transport – it is not a charity although most of its employees at coastal stations are volunteers who receive training in all aspects of rope rescue, mud rescue, water rescue, casualty care and search duties in all weathers. If someone calls for the Coastguard they will be put through to the Joint Rescue Coordination Centre at Fareham who will immediately page the local Coastguard Station and the rescue teams will be called out. They will continue to monitor the rescue until the person/persons are taken to a place of safety.

HM Coastguard also operate aircraft and helicopters – the red and white whirlybirds we often see flying over Chideock. We are lucky to be within short flying distance of six aircraft from three bases. Next time you see one flying over the village you can be confident that the rescue operation is in good hands.

The Book Group have read *The Rosie Project* by Graeme Simsion, not everyone's cup of tea but had some of us in fits of laughter. Next month we will be reading Victoria Hislop's new novel *The Figurine* – the perfect holiday read for those of us flying off to the sun. Lunch and Natter Group will be trying out the new café/restaurant, The Lemon Tree at Swyre, that has had some good reviews recently.

Our next meeting in October will welcome Chris Stevens from Bridport Museum who will be talking to us about Rural Life in the Old Days and we will be hunting out memorabilia of those times for our competition. Do come to one of our talks, you will be very welcome.

Clapps Mead Play Area

It is with regret that the Parish Council must inform you that the trampoline at Clapps Mead play area will soon be removed. Despite our tireless efforts to secure public liability insurance, we have been unable to do so. As safety is our top priority, we have no choice but to take this step. We appreciate your understanding and will keep you updated on any future improvements to the play area.

I am ending this with a plea – there is a lot to do in the Parish at the moment and we are only 5 councillors – we have room for 2 more and would welcome the input very much. CITIZEN'S ADVICE Battery safety

Binned batteries and electricals containing batteries caused more than 1,200 fires over the last year, and many local authorities say the problem is getting worse. Dorset Council Waste Services are urging people to remove batteries from devices before binning them and to recycle them at the correct places.

Batteries in bins can cause fires in both collection vehicles and at facilities where the vehicle contents are delivered to. These fires can be challenging for fire services to deal with, and they endanger the lives of staff working on lorries and at waste plants.

In addition, it is estimated that 1.6 billion batteries were thrown away last year as opposed to being recycled. Recovering valuable raw materials from batteries, such as nickel, zinc, cadmium and lithium can be turned into new products. For example, the lithium collected from batteries could power thousands of electric cars.

If your electrical item contains batteries, they may cause a fire if not recycled properly, so don't bin them. If possible, remove the batteries from your electricals and recycle them separately. Batteries can be recycled at many local retailers, household recycling centres, or you can put them in a small plastic bag and leave them on top of your recycling bin on collection day. If you can't remove the battery, then recycle the whole item at your local household recycling centre next time you visit.

Common household batteries include lithium-ion 'button' batteries from watches, hearing aids, toys, etc. as well as standard barrel-type batteries such as AAs and AAAs.

'Button' batteries should never be left in reach of small children, as if swallowed, they could badly injure or kill a child. Larger lithium 'coin cell' batteries (about the size of a five pence piece) are the most dangerous. Smaller batteries can be inserted into places such as ears and noses, causing serious injuries for children if undetected.

By taking care of batteries and recycling them properly we can prevent fires, help recover valuable material and keep young children safe.
