Chideock Defibrillator

Please be aware that the defibrillator that was positioned on the outside wall of The George is now out of action and has been removed for repair and refurbishment. We hope to be able to place this defibrillator or a new one outside the Spar shop in the next few months so that the village is not without a defibrillator. We now understand that the current defibrillator is approaching its end of lifespan and really not viable to be refurbished.

We have applied for and received a grant for a match funded defibrillator, we will shortly be raising an appeal from the village and local community for funding to support this chance of a new defibrillator.

If one is needed urgently in the meantime there is one at the shop at The Golden Cap Holiday Park in Seatown as well as at Aberlon and there is also one at The Anchor in Seatown.

BLLINK (Bridport to Lyme Link) News update.

In July we reported the issue with the gas main running along the course of the first section of the proposed new all-weather path between Park Farm and Quarr Lane. The Senior Ranger for Dorset Council (the officer responsible for public rights of way) has recently completed exploratory excavations. An engineer from the company responsible for the gas pipeline (SGN) has been present during the excavations which have demonstrated that it runs at least 7 metres from the hedge line. We understand that any fencing work must be at least 3 metres from the pipeline, so a path of at least 4 metres width is feasible. The Ranger is now preparing the paperwork (risk assessment and methods statement) for the proposed works to submit to SGN for formal approval. We understand that there is a budget provision to fence and surface this section of the path and their aim is to complete the work before the end of the Council's financial year (March 2025). Thanks are certainly due to the Senior Ranger and his team for all the work they have done and to SGN for their co-operation in reviewing the issue.

As previously reported, we are continuing to explore how to complete the safe route to the pre-existing pavement at the former London Inn on West Road, Bridport. Ownership of some of the land has been established and approaches will be made soon after confirmation that the current works can go ahead.

Madagascar Overseas Challenge for Weldmar Nov 2024

Months of training, investing in kit, organising events to help smash fundraising targets, taking on demanding terrain over 5 days on the trek. Yes, our Overseas Challenge was exactly that - challenging! We also spent a little time afterwards on a community project, helping to revamp facilities in a local classroom.

We had travelled from our homes in Dorset to our first hotel in Madagascar, taking 84 hours, this was our first sleep.....then straight into the first trek day. The guides arrived, and 30 porters, the trucks loaded with our trek bags, camping gear, one boot full to the brim with bottled water, it was a logistical expedition! They fed us well and looked after us with patience and smiles as we were a mixed group of ages and abilities!

The following day it was a 10 hour day to climb Pic Boby, a difficult and dangerous ascent and worse on the way down in a thunderstorm, super proud of everyone, we smashed it!

Our amazing team of trekkers from Dorset raised over 93k for Weldmar Hospicecare, plus the gift aid which is added later!

Air Quality Action Group

The Group currently comprises four residents Vanessa McAra; Christine Watson; Anna Dunn and George Dunn. The initial Group was set up a few years ago by the then Parish Council to liaise with Dorset Council Environmental. Chideock having been designated as an Air Quality Management Area (AQMA) in 2007 by Dorset Council to address the high levels of traffic related Nitrogen Dioxide (NO₂) present within the Village. In 2021 the then Parish Council sought an independent body to further investigate the air pollution and Bristol University (BU) took this on as a Research Project under Professor Dudley Shallcross and they have been involved with the Village ever since.

In August 2024 BU set up diffusion tubes in the western end of the village to monitor NO₂ at 12 locations. These tubes need to be changed once a month and are then analysed by BU and the results will be plotted over a period of time. They are changed monthly by BU liaising with the AQ Action Group although because of the proximity to the Christmas holidays BU asked the AQ Action Group to carry out the change-over in December, which the Group accomplished on 20th December 2024.

From the initial 2 month's analysis BU have already reported that levels of NO₂ at some locations are still above Statutory Requirements but they require further results before a full and proper assessment can be released.

As part of their research BU will also be undertaking monitoring of traffic related Particulate Matter air pollution (PM2.5 and PM10) and hope to be setting up 2 monitoring stations early in 2025. These monitors will send relevant information automatically on a daily basis straight to Bristol University for a year which will enable them to draw up accurate results as to the amount of PM2.5 and PM10 that is being emitted.

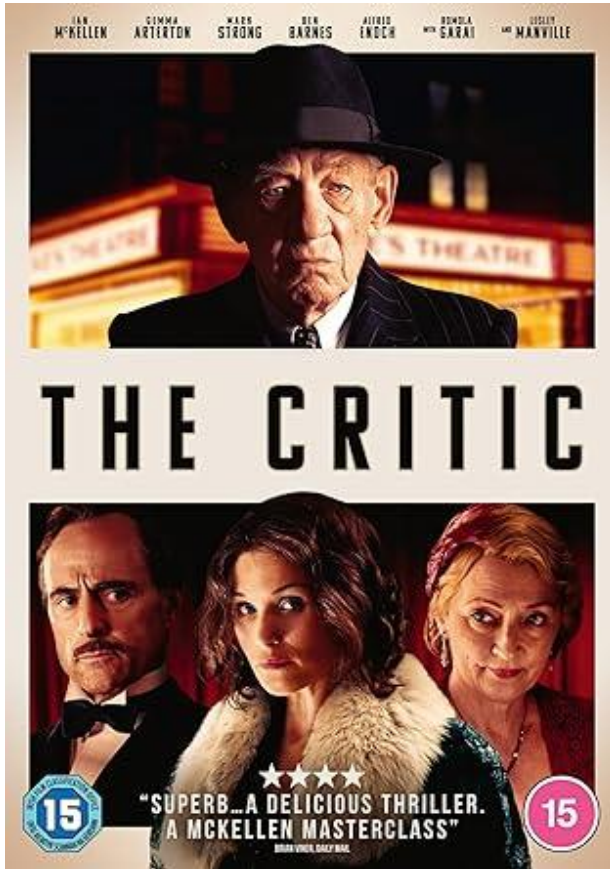

Message from the Chair – Cllr Caroline Parkins

Firstly, on behalf of all five of your Parish Councillors and our Clerk all best wishes for the New Year. May it be a peaceful one would be my wish both here in our Village and in the World.

Although there was no Parish Council meeting in December there has been a fair bit of activity to report to you this month.

Our new grounds maintenance contractor – Derek Smith, started work this week clearing overgrowth and a lot of accumulated debris behind the playground area at Clapps Mead. This revealed that the fence along the river was in a worse state than we thought and parts of it had fallen down. Councillors have put up a temporary fence to warn of the danger and a new fence will be given urgent priority.

The Playground Report that was done for us at the end of last year is interesting reading – the playground is an important issue, and we shall return to it – as soon as the review of the trampoline issue recommended by the Dorset Association of Parish and Town Councils – has been completed.

You may have noticed that one of the panes in the Bus Shelter by the bridge going in an easterly direction – was broken over Christmas – was it an act of vandalism?? In Chideock?? Anyway, it was dealt with and a new pane – this time of mm polycarbonate will be fitted shortly.

The Carol Singing on Christmas Eve round the Village and ending up at the Clock Inn was very well received – much to the delight of the singers! The plan is to do it again next year. £70 was raised for local charities.

One ongoing issue much to the front of our priorities - is Carters Lane and we expect an update shortly from Dorset Council.

Dorset Home Library Service

Bringing the library to you

What could be better than getting lost in a good book?

Do you, or someone you know, love reading but find it difficult to get books from the library due to your caring responsibilities, health or mobility issues?

The Home Library Service is here to help: books and talking books are chosen individually for each person and delivered every three weeks from your local library by Royal Voluntary Service volunteers. This service is free and provides you not only with a regular delivery of books but also a visit by a trusted volunteer who you get to know over time. All our volunteers are DBS checked and carry ID badges.

TRADING STANDARDS ...

Healthy Homes Dorset

At this time of year, we're probably all thinking about ways of keeping our energy costs down. Rogue traders know this and the sale of unnecessary, inappropriate, or poorly fitted roof insulation continues to be a priority area for Trading Standards.

In addition, the BBC recently reported that homeowners with spray foam insulation are struggling to sell or remortgage homes as some major lenders are rejecting properties with it fitted. They found that a quarter of the UK's biggest mortgage providers will not lend against homes with spray foam due to concerns over poor fitting, leaving moisture trapped and roof timbers at risk of decay. They may ask homeowners for documentation showing it has been installed correctly, or for a specialist report to be carried out.

Not only have Trading Standards found instances of rogue traders being involved with the fitting of unnecessary, inappropriate, or poorly fitting spray foam insulation, but then at a later date also being involved in the removal of that same spray foam insulation, either themselves, or bypassing householder details to other linked companies. In effect profiting twice.

In some of the worst-case examples, householders are pressured into have the spray foam removed at what might seem a reasonable price, only to be told part way through the job that a new roof will also be needed.



If you are thinking about making energy efficient improvements to your home, then why not contact Healthy Homes Dorset? They are funded by Dorset Council, BCP Council and Public Health Dorset, and it is delivered by Ridgewater Energy.

Axminster and District Choral Society 1985 – 2025 Forty years of the joy of singing

In February 1985, it was decided to celebrate the 300th anniversary of George Frederick Handel's birth with a "Come and Sing" performance of his "Messiah". This followed a re-ordering of the Minster church, enabling it to host choir and orchestra.

This was a first for the South West and for several weeks before the 24th February a nucleus of about thirty singers rehearsed, so that on the performance day there would be at least a few people familiar with the work.

A local connection produced four international soloists who all waived their performance fees, among them the choir's late President, Roger Stalman, a bass of great renown who also brought along his own accompaniment in The New Elizabethan Chamber Orchestra of which he was the musical director. The response from singers was exceptional, one even cycling from Exeter to take part, and the Minster Church was full to capacity. There was little worry with Health and Safety measures in those days, and extra chairs filled the aisles and the sanctuary. People came from a wide area to both sing and listen, the singers paying £1 and the audience, by programme, £2. How times change! Following this great success the original group of rehearsed singers met and formed the Axminster and District Choral Society (ADCS).
